Subject: New Stop signs Issue

Cleo,

We are receiving repeated complaints regarding the new flashing stop signs from residents Lisa Giolia and Susan Ryan within Hammock Greens IV, as well as from NVR representative Eric Glassman. Mr. Glassman has requested that the flashing stop signs be removed.

The concerns raised include:

- The biggest concern the lights shine directly into nearby units at night, creating a nuisance.
- The signs are perceived as looking "tacky," resembling railroad crossing signals.
- The concern was why these 4 stops signs and not in other locations.
- Also lack of communication on why this area is an issue.

We would like to work collaboratively with the neighbors to address their concerns. Several potential issues and solutions include:

- 1. **Sign Positioning** The current placement appears to direct the lights toward the homes. Adjusting the angle or position could help reduce this direct impact.
- 2. **Lack of Shields** The lights do not currently have shields, causing illumination to extend beyond the necessary area. Installing shields could help contain the light.
- 3. **Timer Adjustment** Modifying the system to limit or disable the flashing lights at night may alleviate much of the disturbance.
- 4. **Motion/Car Sensor** An alternative option would be installing a sensor, so the lights only activate when a vehicle approaches, reducing unnecessary nighttime illumination.

For reference, we have included images showing examples of the area on concern and current setup.

By addressing positioning, shielding, timing, or sensor-based activation, we believe we can work toward a resolution that balances safety with residents' quality of life.

Here is a video from Pelican Bay. It seems that the one they have included a sensor as a car approaches.

Subject: Speed Limit Signs

I spoke to Denise last week because there are new technology developments which have degraded our traffic security. I would be happy to discuss these at length but this is how I see these issues today and my recommendations for improvement.

New Issues:

- the new security badges affixed to car windshields open the security gates 20 yards before the gate, allowing cars to pass through the gates into Pelican Sound at 15 mph+ if they choose. Previously, cars slowed to 5 mph or slower to gain entry.
- Self driving cars are having problems seeing the gates on the Corkscrew entrance/exit because of their small size which makes them hard for these cars to see, at 25 mph, increasing the risk that they will drive through a closed gate. I do not know if this is a problem at US 41 or Williams road entrances.

Existing Issues:

- There is no speed limit sign from the traffic light at Corkscrew and route 41 until you are about 30 yards outside of the gatehouse. At that point there is a sign which reads "Speed Limit 25 mph".
- -There is no "speed limit 25 mph" sign anywhere near the inside of the security gates at Corkscrew, US 41 or Williams road.

Recommendations:

Ask Lee county or Estero to install a "30 mph" sign westbound on Corkscrew (to match the Eastbound speed limit sign) about 100 yards past the traffic light, going toward Pelican Sound. While 30 mph is the legal limit for an unposted, two lane, non rural road, few people are aware of this and some PS people have gotten ticketed (not me).

There needs to be a "Speed Limit 5 mph" sign about 15 yards outside the Corkscrew, US 41 and Williams road entrances.

There needs to be a "speed limit 25 mph" sign immediately inside of the Corkscrew, US 41 and Williams road entrances. Specifically at the Corkscrew entrance this sign needs to be just inside of the gate before the traffic circle (I can explain why). The current "Yield to cars on your left" can be removed as it is redundant.

I am available, if you wish, to discuss this at your convenience.

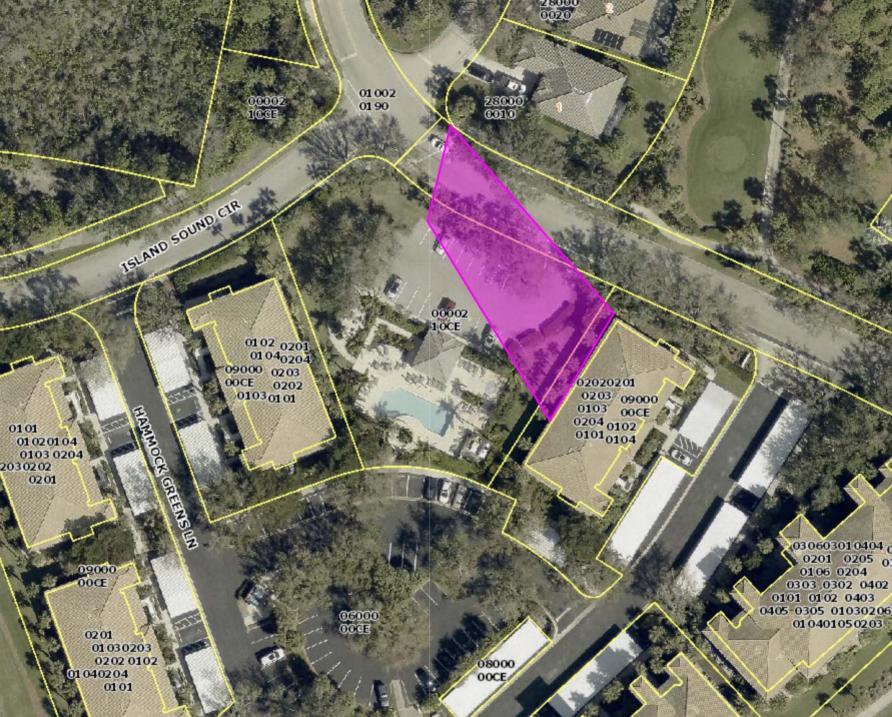

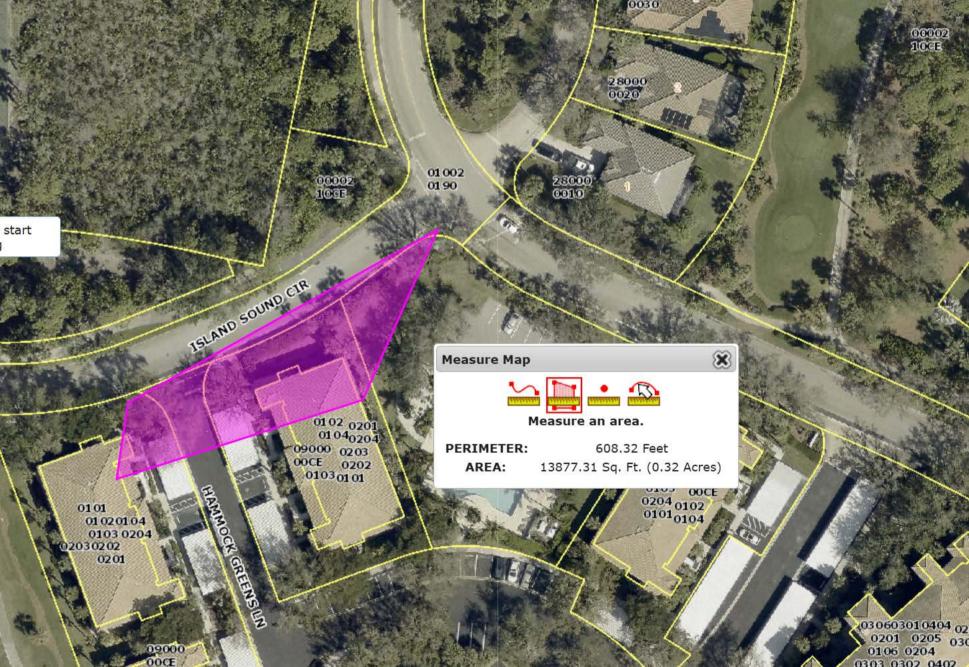

This letter is an attachment to the approved Annual Report form for Year 8 and is intended to address the items listed below:

- Revisions to SWMP in response to past 2 permit cycle pollutant loading increases

- TMDL Implementation for prioritized waterbodies with a nutrient TMDL

River Ridge Community Development District (RR CDD) became a Lee County NPDES permit co-permittee in 2004 when Cycle 2 of FLS000035 became effective. RR CDD has fully participated to the extent of its stormwater structural controls ownership allows and intends to continue as needed to meet future Cycle 5 permit requirements.

Both the Responsible Authority and Designated Stormwater Management Program contacts remain the same as recent Year 5 and 6 annual reports. The Responsible Authority and Designated Stormwater Management Contact has been the District Manager and would be subject to change by Board of Supervisor decision in the future.

RR CDD is a completed commercial and residential development with all discharges limited to unchanged waterbodies since becoming a co-permittee.

The RR CDD stormwater system remains unchanged with regular operation and maintenance activities only to maintain the established stormwater ponds and other structural controls that provide pollutant reduction benefits.

Pollutant loading calculations included in Cycle 3 and 4 permits remain essentially the same due to no changes in land uses within RR CDD.

For the previous cycles and Cycle 4 of the permit, RR CDD has used the Lee County Monitoring Station 47A-4GR and intends to continue this reliance on Lee County Monitoring Plan.

RR CDD does not discharge into a nutrient prioritized waterbody and monitors the development of prioritized water bodies by Lee County.

The receiving water for River Ridge Community Development District stormwater system is the Estero River. A review of the web links contained in the NPDE assist in the identification of local EPA established or FDEP adopted TMDLs was conducted and the Estero River is not listed. Therefore, it is our understand Ridge Community Development District needs take no further action at this time.										

Provide a brief statement as to the status of monitoring plan implementation:

Water quality monitoring for River Ridge CDD uses data from the Lee County Water Monitoring Program at station 47A-4GR. This station is located along the tidal Estero River in Lee County, Florida. That tidal segment of the river is within Water Body Identification (WBID) boundary 3258D1, which is designated as "marine" by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). Monitoring at this station occurs monthly and is analyzed for Chlorophyll-a, Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD), Cadmium, Chloride, Color, Specific Conductance, Copper, Dissolved Oxygen (DO), Fecal Coliform, Enterococci, Ammonia, Nitrite, Nitrate, Nitrate+Nitrite, Ortho-Phosphorus, Lead, pH, Silica, Temperature, Total Kjeldahl Nitrogen, Total Nitrogen (TN), Total Phosphorus (TP), Total Suspended Solids (TSS), Turbidity, and Zinc.

Reporting year summary:

River Ridge CDD uses data from Lee County monitoring station 47A-4GR to determine water quality. 47A-4GR is located near the community along the tidal section of the Estero River. Total nitrogen (TN), total phosphorus (TP), chlorophyll-a, and biochemical oxygen demand (BOD) data have been analyzed to summarize water quality. The wet and dry season concentrations were reviewed for the reporting period and include the 2024 wet season (July, August, and September) and the 2025 dry season (January, February, and March).

The average TN concentrations observed during the reporting year for the wet season and dry season were 0.87 mg/L and 1.12 mg/L, respectively. The wet season value is similar to the previous year but above the Estuary-Specific Numeric Nutrient Criteria (NNC) threshold value of 0.63 mg/L for Estero Bay, the dry season sample was higher than the previous year and above the NNC threshold. The NNC value represents an annual mean not to be exceeded more than once in a consecutive three-year period.

The average TP concentrations observed during the reporting year for the wet season and dry season were 0.02 mg/L and 0.05 mg/L, respectively. Both values are below the applicable NNC threshold value of 0.07 mg/L. The NNC value represents an annual mean not to be exceeded more than once in a consecutive three-year period.

The average Chlorophyll-a concentrations observed during the reporting year for the wet season and dry season were 1.2 μ g/L and 2.4 μ g/L, respectively. The wet season value is similar to the previous year and is below the applicable NNC threshold value of 5.9 μ g/L, the dry season value was much lower than the previous year and below the NNC threshold. The NNC value represents an annual mean not to be exceeded more than once in a consecutive three-year period.

The average BOD concentrations observed during the reporting year for the wet season and dry season were 0.02 mg/L and 1.3 mg/L, respectively. Both values are moderate and similar to the previous year. There are no NNC water quality thresholds for BOD.

Long-term summary:

Water quality for River Ridge was analyzed using samples collected from nearby Lee County monitoring station 47A-4GR along the tidal Estero River. That tidal segment of the river is within WBID 3258D1, which is designated as "marine" by FDEP. Water quality data for TN, TP, Chl-a, and BOD was plotted and evaluated over a 10-year period from the dry season of 2015 through the dry season of 2025.

Average TN concentrations reported from samples collected in the wet seasons have remained relatively steady since 2015 but have remained above the NNC threshold value of 0.63 mg/L for Estero Bay. Average TN concentrations reported from samples collected in the dry seasons also remained relatively steady from 2015 through 2023 but have been slightly higher in 2024 and 2025. The average TN concentrations for the dry seasons have also remained above the NNC threshold value of 0.63 mg/L for Estero Bay.

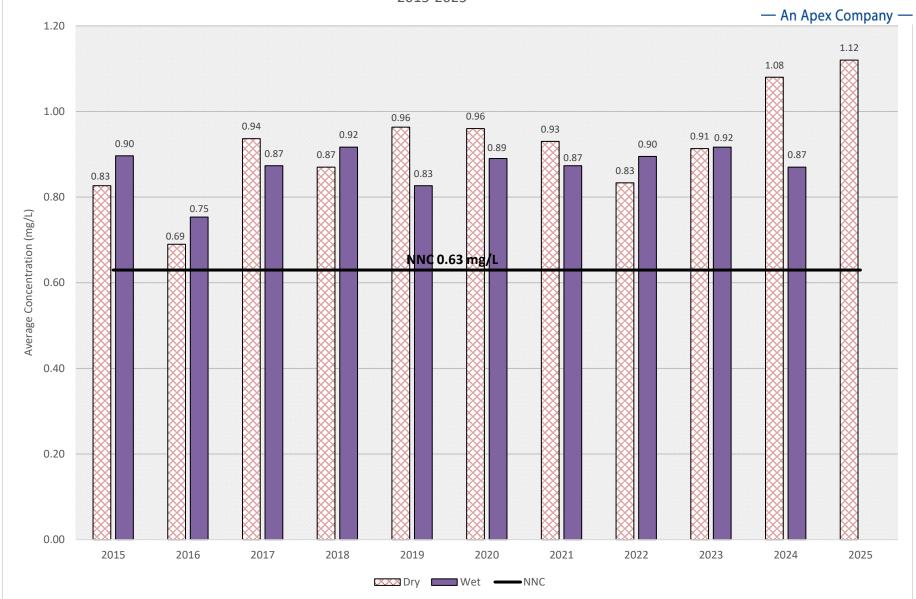
Average TP concentrations reported from samples collected in both the wet and dry seasons have been relatively steady and have consistently remained below the NNC threshold value of 0.07 mg/L for Estero Bay, except for the average dry season concentration in 2024, which was at the threshold value.

Average Chlorophyll-a concentrations reported from samples collected in the wet seasons have fluctuated but most have been below the NNC threshold value of 5.9 μ g/L for Estero Bay. Average Chlorophyll-a concentrations reported from samples collected in the dry seasons have also fluctuated with reported values above and below the NNC threshold value of 5.9 μ g/L for Estero Bay, with a high exceedance in 2024 due to a high concentration in February.

Average BOD concentrations reported from samples collected in both the wet and dry seasons have fluctuated but have been relatively low to moderate. There are no NNC water quality thresholds for BOD.

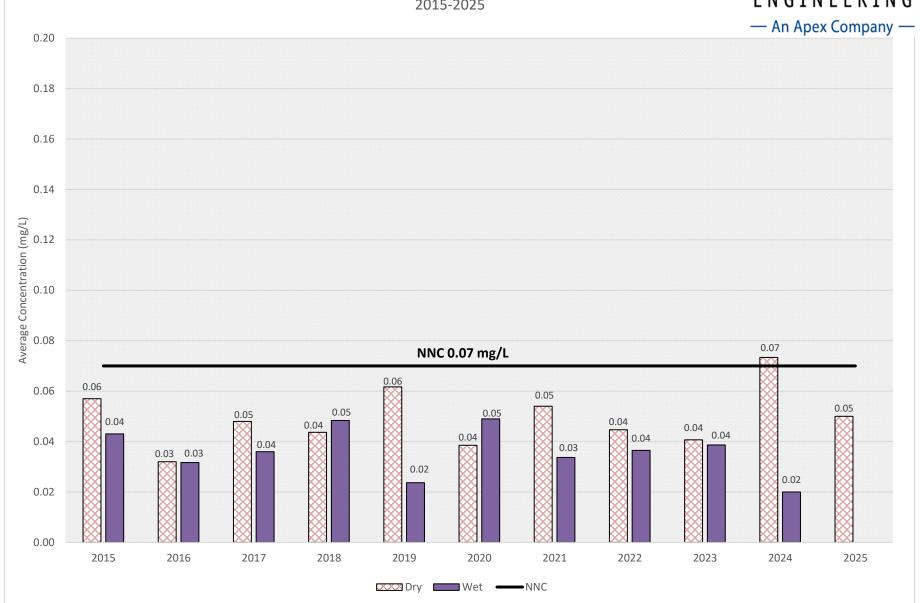


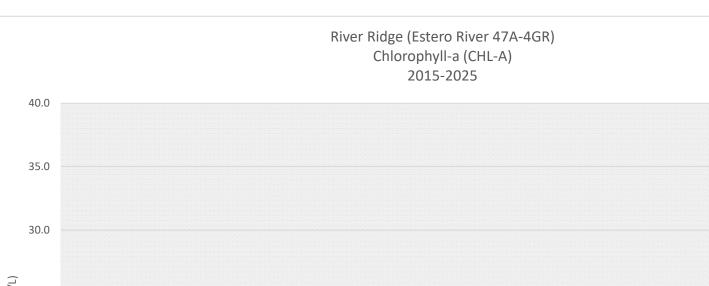




River Ridge (Estero River 47A-4GR) Total Phosphorus (TP) 2015-2025

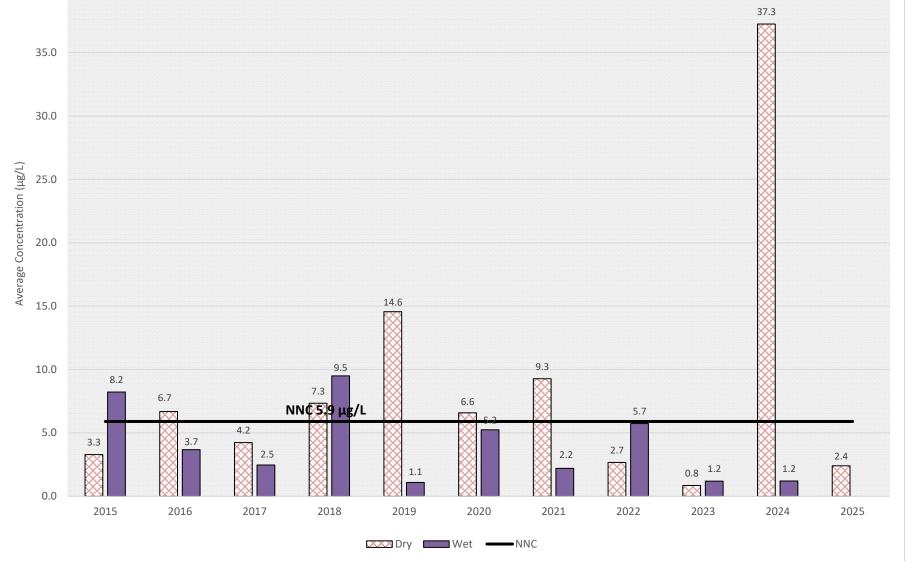


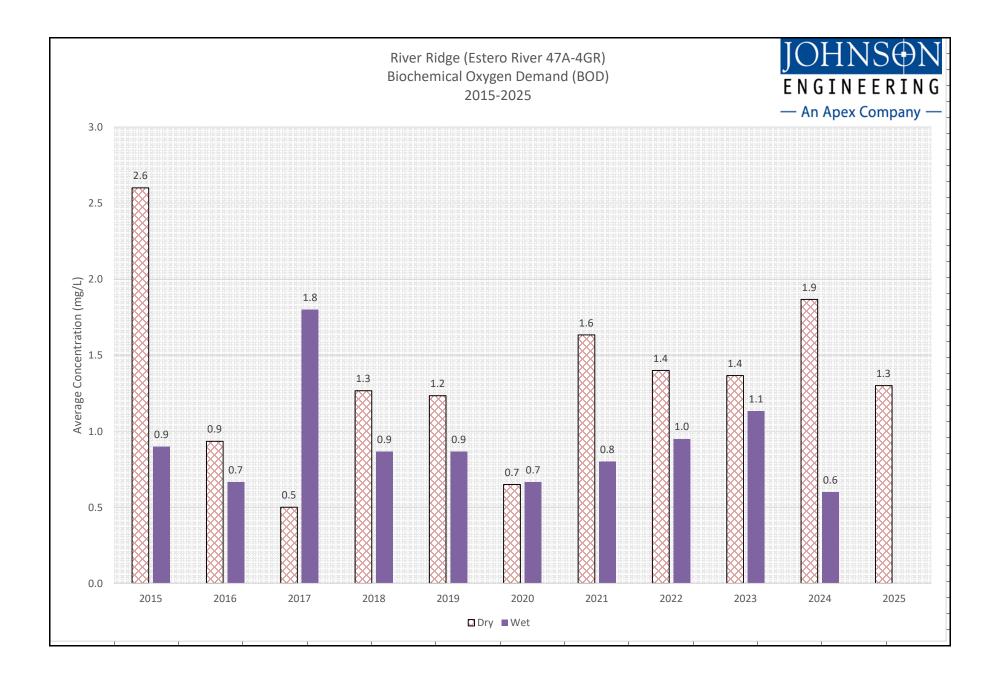

Mr. Adams presented Resolution 2025-10. It was necessary to reschedule the August 26, 2025 budget Public Hearing because a procedural error by the third-party contractor responsible for sending the Mailed Notices resulted in missing the 20-day notice deadline. He apologized for the inconvenience and thanked the Board for accommodating the need for an additional meeting. Because the first notices did not include both of the assessments, it was necessary to send second Mailed Notices to Pelican Sound residents, who are subject to both assessments.

Mr. Adams stated he brought one complete 39-page set of Mailed Notices; he can provide copies upon request. District Management, who engaged the mailing contractor, will pay all additional costs related to re-noticing the meeting.

On MOTION by Mr. Blumenthal and seconded by Mr. Mountford, with all in favor, Resolution 2025-10, Amending Resolution 2025-05 to Reset the Date, Time, and Location of the Public Hearing Regarding Proposed Budget for Fiscal Year 2025/2026, Ratifying the Actions of the District Manager and Chairman in Resetting Such Public Hearing; Providing a Severability Clause; and Providing an Effective Date, was adopted.

SIXTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Public Hearing on Adoption of Fiscal Year 2025/2026 Budget

 Mr. Adams presented Resolution 2025-08. The budget is unchanged since it was last
 presented in June. A July meeting was not held due to quorum issues, and the following meeting
 was rescheduled, as previously discussed. He reviewed the proposed Fiscal Year 2026 budget,
 highlighting increases, decreases and adjustments, compared to the Fiscal Year 2025 budget, and
 explained the reasons for any changes. Due to a small insurance increase, slight adjustments
 were made to the General Fund, which is shared by everyone in Pelican Sound, as well as The
 Meadows and the commercial properties outside the gate. Field services increases were related
 to the landscape maintenance contract and plant replacement line items. The Assessment

Consideration of Resolution 2025-08, Relating to the Annual Appropriations and

Summary, on Page 2, reflects a General Fund Assessment year-over-year increase from \$143.38 to \$177.21.

Mr. Adams discussed the Special Revenue Fund Budget line item increases for Engineering, lake and wetland operations, drainage pipe annual inspection and cleaning, lake bank remediation/dry retention enhancements, roadway repairs and maintenance/traffic calming, and Contingencies related to long-range capital improvements beginning in 2026. The Assessment Summary, on Page 7, reflects a Special Revenue Fund Assessment of \$1,031.71; which applies only for homeowners within the boundaries of Pelican Sound, because the gates generally prevent the public from accessing Pelican Sound. Special Revenue Fund assessments were flat for several years and this increase of approximately 20%, year-over-year, was necessitated by the capital improvements that will be undertaken over the next several years.

Mr. Mountford thinks more written detail is needed when large increases occur.

Mr. Adams stated additional capital outlay will be discussed further. He believes an informational communication should probably be sent. The writeup on Page 8 indicates the \$745,000 capital outlay related to an additional irrigation well, as well as prefunding the eventual upgrades to the gatehouses and monument signs. The projects are included in the Key Activities.

Discussion ensued regarding the desire to clarify the wording of Mailed Notices.

Mr. Adams stated the language must follow Statutory requirements. He believes the supplemental mailing to homeowners will remedy the issue.

Mr. Adams opened the Public Hearing.

Resident Ed Nowak asked about the aggregate assessment increase per \$100,000 assessed valuation. Mr. Blumenthal stated the assessment increase is applied on a per lot basis. Mr. Pires stated the CDD levies a Special Assessment that is not based on value; rather, it is based on the benefit to each parcel based on several factors. The millage rate and value are not relevant. The Property Appraiser assigns an appraised or assessed value for Ad-Valorem tax purposes, for Lee County, the Village of Estero and others. The CDD levies Non-Ad Valorem, non-value based Special Assessments, so the valuation of the property is not a factor. Mr. Blumenthal stated homeowner assessments for property in Torrey Pines, Pinehurst and Gleneagles will be the same, irrespective of the assessed property values. Mr. Nowak asked how much his assessment will increase. Mr. Adams stated if he lives in Pelican Sound, between the two funds, assessments will increase about \$186, year-over year.

Resident Jerry Weisenhower asked how much the total Pelican Sound assessment will be. Mr. Adams it will be a little over \$1,200 per home. Asked what the increase can specifically be attributed to, Mr. Adams stated the biggest item planned for the next four years is, the \$745,000 "Capital outlay" line item. Mr. Weisenhower asked if any one item represents a major increase. Mr. Adams stated it is primarily the Gatehouse and Monument Signage and the addition of another well for redundancy in irrigation supply. Another phase of stormwater management will also be discussed later in the meeting. Mr. Weisenhower asked if the stormwater management project will continue beyond Fiscal Year 2026. Mr. Adams stated the project does have an end; it has multiple phases. Asked if assessments can expect to be reduced when the project ends, Mr. Adams stated he will not make any promises but, theoretically, it is a possibility.

It was noted that assessments have not increased since 2022.

No other affected property owners or members of the public spoke.

Mr. Adams closed the Public Hearing.

On MOTION by Mr. Blumenthal and seconded by Mr. Twombly, with all in favor, Resolution 2025-08, Relating to the Annual Appropriations and Adopting the Budget for the Fiscal Year Beginning October 1, 2025, and Ending September 30, 2026; Authorizing Budget Amendments; and Providing an Effective Date, was adopted.

Mr. Adams presented Resolution 2025-09. This is the Assessment Levying Resolution that takes into consideration the budget that was just adopted and the assessment levels contained therein and directs Staff to prepare a lien roll and transmit the lien roll to the Tax Collector for placement of the assessments on the property tax bill.

Mr. Adams opened the Public Hearing.

No affected property owners or members of the public spoke.

Mr. Adams closed the Public Hearing.

On MOTION by Mr. Blumenthal and seconded by Mr. Merrill, with all in favor, Resolution 2025-09, Making a Determination of Benefit and Imposing Special Assessments for Fiscal Year 2025/2026; Providing for the Collection and Enforcement of Special Assessments, Including but Not Limited to Penalties and Interest Thereon; Certifying an Assessment Roll; Providing for Amendments to the Assessment Roll; Providing a Severability Clause; and Providing an Effective Date, was adopted.

EIGHTH ORDER OF BUSINESS

Continued Discussion/Update: Storm Water Management Phase III

Mrs. Adams distributed the handout and map provided by Mr. Long.

Referring to diagrams and photographs, Mr. Long gave an update on the Storm Water Management Phase III project. He discussed and noted the following:

- Multiple projects are scheduled for 2026.
 - The approved Permit for Phase II of the additional well was received. Mr. Krebs was asked to start the bidding process. The target budget amount is \$285,000. The well is next to the existing community pump station by the pool in Turnberry.
 - Mr. Long displayed pictures, identified each area on the map and discussed the scope of work, plantings, potential issues and drainage of each location.
- The Stormwater Management Phase III project will address Turnberry Sound 1, the Oak
 Run Lakes 8 left side, the Seaside III Lakes 8 top left and Palmetto Dunes Sound 3.
- 213 Discussion ensued regarding lake levels and drainage.
 - Mr. Long discussed a new control structure where water discharges into E8-C and flows into the retention area, over the grate, into the control structure and then to the Florida Power & Light (FPL) ditch. He recommended modification of the control structure.

Discussion ensued about an eyesore off River 9 that discharges for weeks during heavy rain. Permitting will not allow tying into the drain but it is allowed to sheet flow naturally into the drain. Permitting different basin lines would be necessary to reroute water flows back to E-8C.

Mr. Long stated that is a different matter. He suggested getting lake elevation numbers to determine if it is possible to dredge and save fill dirt. Sod will be needed and, based on cost, it might be necessary to implement the project in four phases if fill dirt is needed. He suggested Mr. Krebs develop the Exhibit; bid sheets will need to be graded to facilitate the bidding process.

Discussion ensued about poor water flow in the canal and keeping the flow way cleaned.

Mr. Krebs stated that MRI was supposed to clean the pipe this time. While the water might seem to be stagnant when viewed at the pipe, it is not stagnant; water is flowing through slowly at only 2 cubic feet per second.

Mr. Krebs will ask MRI for a proposal for modification of the control structure.

Asked if the additional well is necessary given the high rain levels, Mr. Long stated some of the worst droughts have been in May. Without a redundant pump as a backup, if the pump fails during a drought and it takes 60 days to repair, there would be extensive vegetation issues . He stated the pump runs 24 hours a day, 7 days a week during drought season. He thinks it is wise to invest the \$285,000 for a redundant well to preserve the CDD's landscape assets.

NINTH ORDER OF BUSINESS Discussion/Consideration: Southern Striping Proposal [Asphalt Patching]

This item was removed.

TENTH ORDER OF BUSINESS Presentation: Neighborhood Monuments Design Development

Mr. Long presented the Neighborhood Monuments Design Development Presentation, and described initial renderings and specifications for entrance signage.

The Board and Staff discussed the locations, aesthetics and signage quantities.

Regarding line-of-sight issues, Mr. Long stated that the Pinehurst and Seaside Edgewater monuments could be set further back; adjustments to the placement of flowers can also be considered. If initial designs are acceptable, more refined designs can be presented later. Additional permitting and zoning approvals might also be required.

Mrs. Adams will forward Mr. Long's video to the Board.

ELEVENTH ORDER OF BUSINESS Discussion: Pelican Sound Traffic Violations

Report 2025

This item was deferred.

TWELFTH ORDER OF BUSINESS Discussion: Speed Limit/Stop Signs

Mrs. Adams recalled that, in response to her email, AV-Tech advised that there is nothing they can do. Mr. Long turned the lighted signs off.

Mr. Schultz asked Mr. Krebs to ask Bowman's Traffic Engineers to seek a solution. Mr. Krebs stated they can look at it. He believes residents consider the lighted signs a major failure.

Mr. Long stated the signs will remain off until further discussions occur.

This item will be included on the next meeting agenda.

THIRTEENTH ORDER OF BUSINESS Discussion: Short Term Loan

Mr. Adams stated he, Mr. Blumenthal and Mr. Long met to consider additional costs and updated costs for projects for the next four years. He distributed and presented a list of projects with updated costs, which are grouped in the hopes of receiving a better rate than the rate offered for short-term loans. This is advantageous in working with Synovus because the contact retired and Synovus does not have in-house expertise or time for smaller loans. The current project list, sized at just under \$1.8 million, would provide construction proceeds of \$1.73 million. Repayment terms would be just under \$400,000 per year. He reviewed the Bond Estimate and stated that, at 4% interest for five years, the annual principal and interest per unit would be \$308. This amount partially funds the amount needed; they project that the CDD will start to go positive in amounts collected in comparison to amounts spent within a couple of years. The 2022 Note will be paid off in May 2027 so, at that time, those funds will be available to put towards this project as well. Some projects are two-to-three years out and will be funded by a combination of the proceeds of the 2026 note and funds on hand. The handout has one adjustment; the numbers have been trued-up to correspond with the Fiscal Year 2026 budget amount adopted today.

Mr. Adams discussed the Proposed Budget 2025-2035 and Future Projects for the Series 2026 5-year note and Series 2026 20-year bond; the 2026 projects will begin in late spring 2026.
